Hello friends,

As ever, I hope this edition of the St Olave's Newsletter finds you well and in good spirits.

Back on Easter Monday I ticked off one of my major life adventure boxes. Thanks to the generosity of my dear son and daughter, I went up in a Hot Air Balloon! It took me 4 ½ years to be able to do it. As I needed to have the perfect weather conditions (not always easy in Britain as we know!) and of course that needed to match the time when I was free. But when the day arrived and with it some decent weather, I could hardly believe it.

There was a high level of concern as I needed to book the ferry as it was filling up fast, in the hope that the flight would take place. And then get across to a little village called Dunsfold, which is between Godalming and Billingshurst near to the Surrey / Sussex border, within an hour and a half. The flight took off at around 5pm. Both I and the 16 other team members helped to prepare the balloon for take-off by opening up the nylon balloon and stretching it out. Then the pilot slowly filled the balloon up with air from two powerful fans. As the balloon filled with air, then the burners were turned on so that the balloon began to float upwards. It was an incredible sight to behold. As the balloon filled up, we all jumped into the basket and took off. Reaching heights of nearly 2000 feet!

Needless to say, the views were spectacular. Right across the North & South Downs stretching as far as Central London to the north and even to the Island and Brighton to the south. The burners needed to be fired on several occasions but otherwise there was a peaceful serenity around us as the sun slowly set.

We flew slowly over some stunning properties with significant landscaping enhancing the countryside with rivers and ponds scattered around, before coming down to land. It truly was a breathtakingly spiritual encounter.

I'll have to get my thinking cap on for my next adventure!

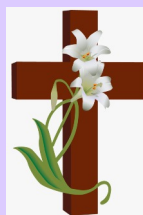

Your Church Matters!!

Following 30 months with the vacancy, at the Annual Vestry Meeting on Sunday 10th May it was our great pleasure to wholeheartedly receive the nominations of Donna Dempsey and Steve Denness to take upon the roles of Churchwardens. They join (already established in their roles) Sue Hardy (Treasurer), Louise Parsons (Deanery Synod Rep and Safeguarding Officer) and myself, Jill Webster (PCC Secretary). The Annual Parochial Meeting followed and comprehensive reports were received from all Officers. Church Electoral Roll Officer, Carolyn Hoyle has resigned leaving that role vacant. Revd Steve thanked all Officers, PCC Members, Sidespeople, Fund-Raisers and everybody who supports St Olave's.

At The PCC Meeting on May 7th Safeguarding was discussed at some length. Shortly all PCC Members will undertake the training required for their roles and Safeguarding information will be held in the church ensuring that Gatcombe is fully compliant.

The Isle of Wight Rifles Flag, belonging to Gatcombe Church and currently in their safe keeping in the Carisbrooke Castle Museum, will be formally gifted to the Museum rather than remain 'on loan.' Displaying it in the church would be difficult and detrimental to the historically valuable flag due to its size and the damp conditions whereas in the museum it will be displayed in carefully controlled conditions.

Concerns over the safety of some leaning gravestones were raised and have already been addressed with measures to be taken to secure them.

Following the publication and recommendations of the Space for Nature Report the lower half of the Graveyard Extension will be re-wilded under advice and supervision. Also suggested in the Report, an Evening Bat Walk will be organized in the near future.

St Olave's Church Dog, Poppy (2011 - 2026)



Many of you who come to St Olave's to help with cleaning the church, doing flowers, gardening in the church yard or just visiting the church will know Poppy, the little shy and nervous Jack Russell who was really our church dog.

Poppy has had a bit of an up-and-down life, full of tragedy, and death.

She started off having a happy puppyhood with an elderly couple, but was attacked by a large, black dog who picked her up and shook her like a rat and nearly killed her - this, understandably, made her very, very nervous. Then, her lady-owner had a stroke and was in a wheelchair being looked after by her husband, and so there wasn't much time for Poppy. Unexpectedly the husband died so Poppy had to be re-homed through Friends of the Animals.

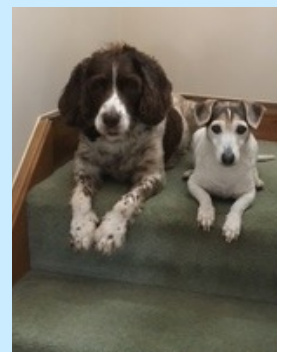
Our lovely, and very much missed, lay reader at St Olave's adopted her and Poppy was just settling down to a happy life with Elizabeth when Elizabeth's health deteriorated and she was rushed into hospital. Poppy came to stay with me for a week or two while Elizabeth was in hospital, but sadly Elizabeth then died and so Poppy came to live with me permanently.

My Springer spaniel, Safi realised Poppy was a damaged soul and looked after her, making sure she wasn't frightened by other dogs on walks. Sadly, a short time later Poppy lost a friend again when Safi died.

I had just lost my husband before Poppy came to me and I feel that 'Him upstairs' (as my Irish friends call God), looked down and realised that I needed Poppy as much as Poppy needed me.

Poppy died last Tuesday. She was nearly blind and deaf and had gone a little senile. I am missing her so much. My darling little lovely four-legged friend.
