The Chrism Eucharist

On Maundy Thursday, 2nd April, Carol and I were delighted to be invited by the Reverends Steve and Emma, together with many clergy, lay ministers, and parish officers from across the Diocese, to attend the annual Chrism Eucharist at Portsmouth Cathedral.

This was our first visit to Portsmouth Cathedral and we found it to be an exceptionally welcoming place. The original church, dedicated to St Thomas a Becket, dates to 1185 and has undergone numerous alterations and extensions over the centuries. The most recent addition, the great west doors featuring the tree of life design, was completed in 1997. The harmonious blend of historical and contemporary elements creates a beautiful, light, and airy space in which to worship.

The congregation, joined by the magnificent Cathedral Choir, rose to sing the opening hymn as Bishop Jonathan, accompanied by other senior clergy from the Diocese, entered in procession. The service followed the traditional order, with prayers, readings, and inspiring music from the choir, including *Gloria in Excelsis* sung in Latin. Bishop Jonathan delivered his sermon in his distinctive style, beginning with a reference to the Artemis 2 rocket launch, and offering thought-provoking and enlightening reflections.

A significant moment of the service was the "Renewal of Commitment to Ministry", during which all those involved in the work of Christ's Church—both lay and ordained—stood in turn. The bishop addressed each group, who then renewed their vows. When it was time for the bishops' renewal, Talitha, one of the young people present, addressed them eloquently. Finally, the entire congregation stood, was addressed by the bishop, and prayed for all clergy and their families.

During the Liturgy of the Eucharist, following the Peace, the holy oils were brought in by the Deacons. The bishop blessed each oil in turn: the oil for anointing the sick and dying, the oil for signing the cross at Baptism, and the Oil of Chrism. Communion followed, accompanied by the Choir singing *Agnus Dei* and "Love Bade Me Welcome".



After the service, a light lunch of soup and rolls was served in the hall opposite the Cathedral. The entire day proved to be a wonderful experience for Carol and me, marking another step in our journey of faith and discovery.

At 6am we gathered in the churchyard, around a fire pit, for our Dawn Service. The dawn chorus was amazing and Richard Smout helped identify some of the birds we could hear. We remembered the distress of the disciples on that first Easter morning and we sang Elizabeth Peace's favourite hymn, 'As the deer pants for the water.' The Pascal Candle was then lit and we listened to the Easter readings, read for us this year by Carol and Steve Denness, about Mary Magdalene arriving at the tomb and the wonder of the Resurrection. We processed into the church for the last part of the beautiful and moving service.



Leonie and Michael Terry, who were spending Easter on the other side of the world, kindly donated a lovely selection of Easter Eggs for the two Easter Day services, so everyone was offered a chocolate egg as they went home. Amazingly just as everyone was safely on the way home there was a beautiful rainbow and a short sharp rain storm. Any earlier and the congregation would have got soaked. The sun came out again afterwards, for a glorious sunny Easter Day.



Our second service was a Holy Communion at 11am with the church looking so beautiful with Easter flowers in all the windows and on the altar. As always, a special thank you to the flower arrangers. Revd Steve took the service and Revd Emma gave the sermon. Louise Parsons read the first lesson for us, Lyndon played the amazing Easter hymns for us, and we used St Olave's special Tudor Chalice for communion. We use it at Christmas and Easter and our Patronal Festival but it is on view securely in the Minster Treasury Collection and clearly marked as coming from St O's. Wonderful and moving to think it has been used at the Communion Service for hundreds of years in our tiny village church, to celebrate Christ's birth and His Resurrection. Our dawn service at 6am coincided perfectly with the dawn chorus. We were encouraged to listen to the 'music', and heard at least 13 different species of bird.

Pheasant, Blackbird, Robin and Canada Goose were heard first. They were soon joined by Wood Pigeon, Stock Dove, Wren, Dunnock, Song Thrush, Mistle Thrush, Coal Tit, Carrion Crow and Jackdaw.
